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Monthly Review of the Texas Economy—August 2020 Post-COVID-19 Economic Recovery

The Texas economy continues to recover from COVID-19. The state's economy lost 694,400 nonagricultural jobs from July 2019 to July 2020, an annual decline of 5.4 percent, smaller than the nation's employment decline of 7.5 percent (Table 1 and Figure 1). The nongovernment sector lost 650,300 jobs, an annual decline of 6 percent, also lower than the nation's employment decline of 8.1 percent in the private sector (Table 1). Texas annual job loss rate in July 2020 was the same as in June 2020, indicating a slow recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic recession (Figure 1).

Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in July 2020 was 8 percent, higher than the 3.5 percent in July 2019. The nation's rate increased from 3.7 to 10.2 percent (Table 1).

Texas Employment Percentage Change by Industry

Table 2 shows Texas industries ranked by employment percentage change from July 2019 to July 2020. All Texas industries except financial activities had fewer jobs in July 2020 than in July 2019. Annual job loss rates varied from 1.39 percent in transportation, warehousing, and utilities to 23.96 percent in the state's mining and logging industry. Figures 2 to 13 show trends in employment percentage change by industry.

Texas Job Shares by Industry and the Government Sector

Table 3 shows Texas industries and the state's government sector ranked by their shares of Texas jobs in July 2020. Of the 12,118,700 nonagricultural jobs, the highest percentage of jobs was in the government sector followed by trade, professional and business services, education and health services, leisure and hospitality, and manufacturing. Since July 2019, the government sector; trade; professional and business services; education and health services; manufacturing; financial activities; construction; and transportation, warehousing, and utilities have expanded their shares of Texas employment at the expense of leisure and hospitality, other services, mining and logging, and information. Figures 14 to 25 show trends in shares of total Texas jobs by industry.

Contributions of Texas Industries to Texas Employment Percentage Change

The statewide employment percentage change from July 2019 to July 2020 is the weighted average of employment growth or decline rates of all Texas industries for the period. Weights are shares of jobs by industry. The positive or negative contribution of each industry to the statewide employment percentage change is equal to the employment growth or decline rate in that industry multiplied by its share of Texas jobs. Table 4 shows Texas industries and the state's government sector ranked by their contributions to Texas employment percentage change from July 2019 to July 2020. Financial activities was the state's only industry that had a positive contribution. The rest of the state's industries had negative contributions. Figures 26 to 37 show trends in contributions of Texas industries to Texas job growth or decline rates.

Employment Percentage Changes by Texas Metropolitan Areas

All Texas metros except College Station-Bryan had fewer jobs in July 2020 than in July 2019 (Table 5). Waco had the smallest employment decline followed by Sherman-Denison, Texarkana, Tyler, Abilene, Killeen-Temple-Fort Hood, Dallas-Plano-Irving, Austin-Round Rock, San



Antonio-New Braunfels, and El Paso. Figures 38 to 63 show trends in annual employment growth or decline rates for the state's metropolitan areas.

Texas Job Shares by Metropolitan Area

Table 6 shows Texas metropolitan areas ranked by their shares of total Texas jobs in July 2020. Houston-The Woodlands-Sugar Land had the largest share of Texas jobs followed by Dallas-Plano-Irving, Austin-Round Rock, Fort Worth-Arlington, San Antonio-New Braunfels, El Paso, and McAllen-Edinburg-Mission. Figures 64 to 89 show trends in metropolitan shares of total Texas jobs.

Contributions of Texas Metropolitan Areas to Texas Employment Percentage Change

The statewide employment percentage change from July 2019 to July 2020 is the weighted average of employment growth or decline rates of all Texas metros for the period. Weights are shares of jobs by area. The positive or negative contribution of each metro to the statewide employment percentage change is equal to the employment growth or decline rate in that area multiplied by its share of Texas jobs. Table 7 shows Texas metros ranked by their contributions to Texas' employment decline from July 2019 to July 2020. Houston-The Woodlands-Sugar Land accounted for the largest percentage of the state's employment decline rate followed by Dallas-Plano-Irving, Fort Worth-Arlington, San Antonio-New Braunfels, Austin-Round Rock, Midland, and El Paso. Figures 90 to 115 show trends in contributions of Texas metros to total Texas job growth rates.

Unemployment Rate by Metropolitan Area

The state's actual unemployment rate in July 2020 was 8.2 percent. Amarillo had the lowest unemployment rate followed by College Station-Bryan, Abilene, Sherman-Denison, Lubbock, Waco, and Austin-Round Rock (Table 8).

Employment Percentage Changes by Industry in Largest Texas Metropolitan Areas

Table 9 shows annual growth or decline rates of employment by industry in the six largest Texas metropolitan areas from July 2019 to July 2020. The state's leisure and hospitality industry is bearing the brunt of the COVID-19 pandemic in the major metro areas followed by other services and the information industry.

Nonfarm Employment Growth Rates for Texas and United States




Figure 6 Texas Education and Health Services Industry Annual Employment Growth Rates,2017-2020



Figure 15 Texas Trade Industry



Share of Total Texas Jobs, 2017-2020






Figure 19 Texas Manufacturing Industry Share of Total Texas Jobs,2017-2020







Cayas Transportation Utilities Was



Texas Employment Growth




Figure 36 Texas Trade Industry








Figure 43 Abilene Metro Area





Figure 44 Killeen-Temple Metro Area

Dallas-Plano-Irving Metro






Figure 48 El Paso Metro Area






Figure 49 McAllen-Edinburg Metro Area Annual Employment Growth Rates, 2017-2020 Percent -12






Figure 54 Amarillo Metro Area






Figure 55 Laredo Metro Area










Figure 61 San Angelo Metro Area Annual Employment Growth Rates, 2017-2020





Figure 62 Odessa Metro Area

Figure 64 Houston-The Woodlands-Sugar Land Metro Area Share of Total Texas Jobs, 2017-2020










Figure 70 McAllen-Edinburg-Mission Metro Area Share of Total Texas Jobs, 2017-2020




Figure 75 Brownsville-Harlingen Metro Area




Figure 76 College Station-Bryan Metro Area Share of Total Texas Jobs, 2017-2020









Figure 83 Odessa Metro Area







Figure 85 Texarkana Metro Area

Sherman-Denison Metro Area






Figure 89 Victoria Metro Area






Figure 91 Sherman-Denison Metro Area Contribution to Texas Employment Growth Rate, 2017-2020










Figure 97 Wichita Falls Metro Area









Figure 100 Lubbock Metro Area





Figure 101 Laredo Metro Area






Figure 103 Amarillo Metro Area




Figure 108 Corpus Christi Metro Area






Figure 109 El Paso Metro Area





Figure 110 Midland Metro Area
